


The world turns to fictional stories of superheroes to explore what it means to be human. The Church turns to the desert fathers and mothers.


Saint Macarius the Great started a monastery and lived in the desert of Scetis, his story is about compassion.

And so, saint Macarius followed the hyena through the desert. She took him to another cave and he quietly followed.


The hyena came out with two of her cubs who had been born blind.



Miraculously, the little cubs started seeing!




Taking mercy on the little hyena cubs, Saint Macarius prayed over them.

A group of righteous women gathered around Amma syncletica to benefit from her wisdom.






Amma, is voluntary poverty perfectly good?

But the weaker soul, like weak fabric, rips when scrubbed even lightly.






Although the action is the same, the result is different. Some are torn and rip, and others are cleaned and renewed. One could say that, for the courageous mind, volunatary poverty is good.


Third Story Saint Moses & the bag of sand

.. interior vigilance is the fruit."





"We should obviously grow the fruit.




That's to say, guard the spirit.

But it needs the protection of the leaves, which is bodily asceticism."




"A Forest in the Desert" is a 184 page graphic novel on the life of the early christian Saint, John the Short.


